Now that the final improvements can move forward, we're thrilled that planes will soon be able to land right next to our station. It's a huge encouragement—and it will make future trips and supplies much easier!

At Christmas, we visited several struggling families in the Eldoret area. Among them was a mother now raising her seven children alone. Her husband passed away a few years ago, and she has been doing her best to keep the family going. She works incredibly hard—often washing laundry by hand all day for others—just to earn a little income.

One of the biggest challenges the family faces is that nearly all the children were born with a physical abnormality: they have six or even seven fingers or toes instead of five. Because of this, the children were often mocked at school, and some were unable to complete their education.

The eldest son, David, dreamed of becoming a mechanic. After a few interviews and much consideration, we were able to help him enrol in a vocational training programme. He's now attending school, and we're keeping in touch to support his progress. Their mother is deeply grateful for every bit of support—especially now that her eldest child has a real chance at a future.

David is just one of many students we're helping through school—because showing God's love often starts with simple, practical acts of kindness.

Keeping the Wheels Turning: A New Truck for the Mission

For over 20 years, the well-known evangelist Reinhard Bonnke travelled across Africa in a mighty Magirus truck. After his ministry season ended, we were entrusted with that very same vehicle—and for another 25 years, we drove it into some of the most remote places, bringing the Gospel where it had never been heard before. But the journey has left its mark. After more than 45 years of rugged service, it's now incredibly difficult to repair. Spare parts are almost impossible to find, and very few drivers know how to operate this older model. It's time for a replacement. We are looking to purchase a robust Howo truck, a Chinese-built model widely used across Africa. These trucks are reliable and easy to maintain—spare parts and mechanics are available even in remote areas. Features like power steering, air conditioning, a synchronised gearbox, and a modern 2023 engine will help reduce fuel consumption and cut down on long-term maintenance costs.

For our team, this also means renewed strength, joy, and motivation to keep going—reaching the most forgotten and hardest-to-reach areas with the Gospel.

So We Can Reach Them Directly: A Pilot's License for Josh

It's time to invest in the next generation—and one crucial step forward is helping Josh get his pilot's license, so our mission aircraft can be used even more effectively.

Flying changes everything. Reaching our mission locations in South Sudan or Northern Kenya by road usually takes two to three days—often over harsh, unreliable terrain. By air, the same trip can be done in just two to three hours. This isn't just a massive time-saver—it also brings health and safety benefits, allows for faster, more spontaneous responses, and gives us far greater flexibility for ministry and logistics. And importantly, it means less time away from family, and more time on the ground with people.

The most affordable and practical option is for Josh to complete his flight training in Florida, USA. The plan is to begin this training in April 2024.

Can we count on your support for this important step forward?

Your partnership makes it possible for us to reach more people, more quickly, and more safely—with the love of Christ.

Dear Reader,

Just recently, I had the privilege of travelling with one of our Kenyan partners and missionaries, Mark Keter, to Nawepak in Eastern Equatoria, South Sudan. What I saw there deeply moved my heart. The people, once unable to read or write, had long lived in a culture marked by violence, witchcraft, theft, and killing. But everything changed. After receiving the Bible in audio form and sharing it openly with one another over three years, they have become a joyful, transformed people. This is exactly what the world needs! When we come to know Jesus as our Saviour and Lord, and allow Him to teach us, we begin to see the world through a completely new lens.

One afternoon in Naliel, South Sudan, the missionary Mark shared his vision with us: how we could take the Good News of Jesus to the Nuba Mountains in Sudan, into Chad, and—God willing—even one day into Libya. Our teams have been using the Disciple Making Movement (DMM) model, and we've seen

thousands come to Christ. What I witnessed in Nawepak last week was like gazing at refined gold: men, women, and children with a deep, genuine love for God. The Gospel and discipleship have given them true hope—despite the daily challenges of poverty, insecurity, and lack.

The way we often "do church" today simply isn't equipped to reach places like this with the Gospel. We're too inward-focused and hesitant to embrace new ways. But even small groups of Jesus-followers can take the Good News to the world's most closed nations. If we're serious about reaching the unreached, we must be willing to think differently. I realise more and more each day how much I still have to learn.

Starting the Day with Prayer Beneath the Trees

or the fourth time now, we've been on the road to South Sudan with a team from a local church here in Eldoret.

This time, the team included three doctors, two pharmacy assistants, two lab technicians, two nurses, and two pastors—each volunteering their time, skills, and hearts for the sake of the Gospel and practical compassion.

Right from the journey's start, we ran into challenges. Just a few hours into the drive, the trailer's wheel bearings gave out, forcing us to search for spare parts and causing a significant delay that tested our patience and perseverance.

Later, at the Pokot-Turkana border, the police wouldn't let us pass due to reports of recent attacks on the road ahead. With no other choice, we stayed the night nearby. Just before midnight, we were shaken by loud gunshots outside the building. Some

team members were so terrified, they hid under their beds. I (Melina) was overwhelmed with fear for Amiel, who had chosen to sleep outside next to the vehicle to keep an eye on our gear. We were all relieved when morning came—a little shaken, but alive and grateful. We later learned it had been a clash between two local groups. Two people were tragically shot—only 50 metres from where we were staying.

After one more day of driving over dusty, rough terrain, we finally reached our station in Naliel, where the real work could begin. Under very basic conditions—often beneath a tree or in old, crumbling buildings—people who had walked three to five kilometres were treated with dignity and care. It was deeply moving to see how tenderly our team cared for the often dirty, dust-covered children and adults, offering both medical

help and human warmth.

There are no medical facilities in Naliel or its surroundings, and many people suffer from a wide range of illnesses—some preventable, others worsened by lack of access to even the simplest treatments. Everyone was immensely grateful that this team had taken time out of their busy schedules to serve in South Sudan. Over just a few days, our doctors saw and treated more than 1,430 patients. They dealt with everything from minor infections to serious internal diseases, including TB. Expectant mothers were also seen by a nurse and a midwife, receiving advice and care they may never have had before.

Each patient received medication for worms and malaria. From our last visit, we knew that around 80% of people were infected with malaria, so this time the goal was to improve immunity and reduce

transmission. One of the doctors is highly experienced in this area and brought the necessary medication, specifically chosen to address local parasite strains.

Studies have shown that malaria parasites remain in human hosts. Mosquitoes spread them by biting an infected person and carrying the parasite to others. If no one has malaria, the mosquito can't pass it on. That's why herd immunity is crucial—not just for survival, but for breaking the cycle of reinfection. We now look forward to seeing the results during the follow-up visit in November, hopeful for long-term change.

This whole mission wasn't just about providing healthcare to the people of Naliel and the surrounding region—it was also a way to awaken a deeper heart for missions in our Kenyan team. Many of them had never travelled this far or seen such need

firsthand. Each morning before we began work, we gathered for a vibrant devotional, sharing the liberating, saving, hope-filled message of Jesus Christ. The singing overflowed with gratitude—thankful that someone had come not only to serve practically, but to speak life and truth in the name of Jesus.

We're so thankful to everyone who supported this trip through prayer and giving. Your partnership helped bring healing, hope, and the message of Jesus to people in desperate need. We still have a supply of medicines left, which will be used during our next outreach in November. Please continue to pray for protection, provision, and lasting fruit.

Why do we do all this?

On the first morning in Naliel, during the devotion, Amiel asked the team a powerful

question: Why do we do this? Why embark on a journey where we nearly walk into a gunfight, drive three days to reach a place full of desperate need—only to have someone thank us by stealing from us in the night?

The answer is simple: love. "For God so loved the world that He gave His one and only Son, that whoever believes in Him shall not perish but have eternal life." (John 3:16) God gave everything for us. Out of that love and thankfulness, we offer our lives—so that even people like the Toposa tribe can come to know His unconditional love. We face challenges and opposition, but in it all, we experience God's protection and faithfulness more than ever.

Strong Women Leaders Are the Foundation for the Future

e look back in awe at all that God has done in South Sudan. After a 50-hour journey without any major complications, we arrived in Naliel—tired, but filled with joy. We were warmly welcomed and treated to delicious meals prepared with love.

SLM – A Remarkable Discipleship Movement

For eight days, we had the privilege of joining Becki and Peter Franz from GFI in witnessing the incredible work of SLM— Seeking the Lost Mission. Over the past six years, this powerful discipleship movement has planted 170 churches, and nearly 35,000 people have come to know Jesus.

Beyond evangelism and church planting, SLM builds schools, supports medical outreaches, drills wells, and offers agricultural training for men in remote regions.

Empowering Women Through Leadership Training

Although women carry much of the burden of ministry, they've rarely had access to leadership training. So it was a real joy to lead two training sessions for women called "Disciples Makers" during our visit.

In the first, a three-day training, we worked with 50 women from around 12 different churches, equipping them to share Bible stories and ask meaningful questions that help others discover God's truth in their own villages.

The second training took place in Nabois, about an hour's drive away. Just three years ago, believers in this area were brutally persecuted. Some men and women were nearly beaten to death—simply for following Jesus. Why? Because the Gospel had begun to change lives: fewer people visited witch doctors and many gave up

drinking alcohol.

But now, three years later, nearly 100 women filled the church for training. Many still bear the scars of those beatings. Among them sat village elders—once their persecutors—and even the most feared witch doctor in the area, who has now given her life to Jesus. Their passion in prayer, love for Scripture, and boldness in sharing Christ moved us deeply. They dream of one day having a school in their village, a functioning clinic, and a well that brings clean water to all.

We left South Sudan with full hearts. We already miss the laughter of the children, the singing and dancing of the women, and we rejoice knowing that this discipleship movement continues to grow—bringing help and hope to body, soul, and spirit across the villages.
